head of starting a family, Chloe and Adam wanted to move up the housing ladder.

'We wanted the next move to be for at least five to 10 years, so it needed to suit our future plans. We weren't averse to a project, having previously renovated our two-bed flat, says Chloe. This house ticked all the boxes: off-street parking, good transport links, two high streets, a quiet location and a garden. 'We loved the large hallway and view of the garden as soon as you walked in. It had been a family home for 50 years, but didn't suit how families want to live now, so it took some work to get the layout right.'

Two weeks after moving in, the couple had life-changing news: 'We found out I was expecting Hector, so we had to get started on making changes,' says Chloe. They hired an architect to design an extension combining the rear reception room and kitchen, to create a big open-plan space plus a new utility and cloakroom. 'We wanted the living, dining and cooking space to be sociable as well as functional.' The other project was in the hallway, where a dated, open-tread staircase was moved from the centre of the house to the party wall. 'It gave us much more usable space, so we knew it would be worth it in the long term, even though we had to move out for six weeks.

'We've achieved what we wanted and got this house to work as our family home. Don't underestimate the power of a good architect! Although our project was relatively simple, their involvement helped make the most of the house. We could extend down into the cellar too, but the house is perfect for us now. We started fairly simple, so we can add to the rooms as we live in them and let the style evolve organically.'





All-white makeover

The hallway was painted green below the dado and magnolia above, with a busy floral carpet, so the couple stripped everything out, painted it white and laid parquet. They even swapped dated dimpled glass in the door for a plainer, frosted variety. It's a blank canvas for us to build on over time. It also means it doesn't feel too cluttered when covered in shoes and coats!



Make it work for you

CHLOE'S CHOICE: EXPOSED BRICKWORK

Impressed by Chloe's fresh take on bare bricks? Here's the lowdown on building brickwork into your space

There's nothing quite like original exposed brickwork to celebrate a home's history. And the good news is, for many lucky homeowners, achieving a brick feature wall costs nothing more than a bit of hard graft...

O Which wall should I choose? Exposed brick is a pretty bold statement and will be the room's focus, so it pays to stick to one wall or a section of wall with natural start and finish points, such as a chimney breast or inside alcoves. A wall without doors, windows or radiators will be the easiest to strip.

How do I do the work myself? Drill a test hole in the plaster to check the brickwork. If it's damaged or the colour isn't your bag, accept defeat and refill the hole. If you go ahead, cover every surface and seal doors. Work from left to right, hammering and gently lifting the plaster off with a trowel or putty knife. Remove any loose cement or brickwork with a stiff fibre brush, then vacuum the wall. 'If cavities are left exposed, repoint them to avoid draughts or creepycrawlies,' says Georgina Burnett of thehomegenie.com.

Will they need to be sealed? Sealing will alter the colour and look of the brickwork and, once

done, it can't be reversed. However, in moisture-prope kitchens and bathrooms, a coat of PVA or terracotta sealant is recommended. On floors, try Lithofin's MN Stainstop (£22, Amazon).

What if I don't want the red-brick colour?

Once cleaned and prepped, apply a primer and undercoat that's suitable for masonry, using a roller with a medium to long pile. Once thoroughly dry, paint with a water-based acrylic paint intended for interior use. As brick is porous. you'll need at least two coats.

Q Can I fake it? You can - and brick slips could be the answer. These veneer bricks faithfully mimic a solid brick wall but are much thinner and will take up less space. Large areas may need to be installed using a panel system, but smaller sections can be glued onto a solid wall, just like regular tiles. Once pointed, they're incredibly realistic.
